Swarf fires - Neat metal working oils may fume, thermally decompose or ignite if they come into contact with red hot swarf. As an additional precaution swarf should be regularly cleared from the immediate area to prevent the risk of fire. In a fire or if heated, a pressure increase will occur and the container may burst.

#### Methods and materials for containment and cleaning up

#### **Precautions for safe handling**

**Protective measures**

# Appropriate engineering controls
